Archaeological background:

The site lies on the eastern side of Sheepen, a Late Iron Age settlement and industrial centre established by the Catuvellauni tribe and maintained in the years after the Roman conquest (Scheduled Ancient Monument no 46). Extensive excavations in the 1930s and smaller-scale work in 1970 and later have produced evidence of workshops engaged in a range of industrial activities including metal-working, enamelling, pottery-making and leather-working in the areas to the west of the site (Hawkes & Hull 1947; Niblett 1985). A late 1st-century temple was excavated by the Colchester Excavation Committee in 1935 on the site of St Helena School (Hull 1958, 224-34). The outer 'temenos' wall of the temple precinct appears to lie underneath Sheepen Road and may be crossed by the cable trench.

A Roman timber-lined well was found in the 1930s to the north within the grounds of Colchester Institute. A watching brief carried out at Colchester Institute in 2001 produced an assemblage of 1st-century AD Roman amphoras and mostly 1st-century AD pottery. Several pits were recorded, one of which was datable to the early Roman period. A short stretch of mortared Roman tiles, presumed to be a wall or foundation to a Roman building, was found by the contractors after the watching brief had finished (CAT Report 131).

Brief report:

Scheduled Monument Consent was given for a trench to be dug along part of the southern boundary of the school. This was for the purpose of installing a new electricity mains supply cable. The approximately 100m-long trench stretched from the south-eastern boundary of the school, along a grass bank adjoining Sheepen Road, to the 'boys' entrance' at the front of the school building. The trench was dug to 700mm depth and 300mm width using a mechanical excavator fitted with a toothless bucket. The Colchester Archaeological Trust (CAT) carried out a watching brief on this work.

600-700mm of topsoil (Layer or L1) sealed a dry light brown silt subsoil (L2) which contained tile flecks. L2 rose up slightly to the west. Roman pottery, Roman tile, peg-tile and occasional animal bone came from L1 and the interface with L2. Contractors retrieved a 3rd-century Roman coin from the western end of the trench. No features were observed. The presence of a small amount of Roman material is to be expected and indicates Roman activity on the site. It is suspected that the trench was not deep enough to expose Roman or Iron Age features as it was dug through a grassy verge which was slightly higher than the school car-park. The only features of note were reinforced concrete foundations, said by the caretaker to be the remains of air-raid shelters which once stood to the east and west of the main school entrance.

Finds

Roman vessel form numbers follow those of the Camulodunum (Cam) Roman pottery type series (Hawkes & Hull 1947; Hull 1958). Late Iron Age and Roman pottery fabrics used follow those devised for *CAR* **10** with the addition of the fabric Late Iron Age grog-tempered ware which has been given the letter code GTW by Stephen Benfield of CAT. Fabric WPW/NOG WH1 follows Tomber & Dore 1998.


