Summary of fieldwork results:

The site is located to the south east of the village of Tillingham on the Dengie Peninsular, located on reclaimed marshland. The area is characterised by small isolated farms scattered throughout flat open fields protected by a sea wall, the result of reclamation of the Dengie and Tillingham marshes in the 19th century. The now-demolished Howe Farmhouse consisted of a two-storey structure on late 18th/early 19th century origin that had been unoccupied since the 1950s. A comprehensive building recording survey was carried out by CAT in February 2013 (CAT Report 690) prior to its demolition.

A watching brief was carried out in June/July 2013, on behalf of Mr Nicolas Mee in accordance with a brief prepared by ECC (Medlycott 2013). Observations were made during the excavation of ground beams for a new build on the previous site of Howe Farmhouse. The footprint of the new build has been moved 7m south of Grange Road and was therefore excavated into what would have been the associated farmyard rather than in the original footprint of the dwelling. The ground beams were excavated though modern topsoil (L1) and into natural geological deposits (L2) of boulder clay and sand, to a formation depth of 900mm-1.1m.

No archaeological features or materials were observed, although brick and tile associated with the demolition of the farmhouse was observed in the north edge of the ground beams, (this would be material from the rear of the house). In addition more recent 20th century infrastructure (water and drainage) was observed on the eastern edge of the ground

beams.

The lack of archaeological material suggests that the footprint of the new build is located within the area of the yard associated with Howe Farm, an area that was marsh land on the fringes of the Dengie peninsular until the reclamation of the marshes and the foundation of the farm itself in the late 18th early 19th centuries.
