

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1 Summary

Archaeological monitoring was carried out on land adjacent to the Old White Horse Inn, The Street, Pleshey, Essex during the relocation of a low voltage power network involving the erection of a new pole and excavation of a cable trench. A post-medieval pit was uncovered. This feature was presumably the product of activity at the series of historic cottages where the public house is located.

2 Introduction (Fig 1)

This is the archive report for archaeological monitoring on land adjacent to the Old White Horse Inn, The Street, Pleshey, Essex which was carried out during 1st to 7th October 2019. The work was commissioned by Stormport Professional Services Ltd during the relocation of a low voltage power network involving the erection of a new pole and excavation of a cable trench, and was undertaken by Colchester Archaeological Trust (CAT).

In response to consultation with Essex County Council Place Services (ECCPS), Historic Environment Advisor Alison Bennett advised that in order to establish the archaeological implications of this application, the applicant should be required to commission a scheme of archaeological investigation in accordance with the *National Planning Policy Framework* (MHCLG 2019).

All archaeological work was carried out in accordance with a *Brief for Archaeological Monitoring*, detailing the required archaeological work, written by Alison Bennett (ECCPS 2019), and a written scheme of investigation (WSI) prepared by CAT in response to the brief and agreed with ECCPS (CAT 2019).

All fieldwork and reporting was done in accordance with English Heritage's *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MoRPHE)* (English Heritage 2006), and with *Standards for field archaeology in the East of England* (EAA **14** and **24**). This report mirrors standards and practices contained in the Institute for Archaeologists' *Standard and guidance for archaeological field excavation* (CIfA 2014a) and *Standard and guidance for the collection, documentation, conservation and research of archaeological materials* (CIfA 2014b).

3 Archaeological background

The following archaeological background draws on the Brief and the Essex Historic Environment Record (EHER) held at Essex County Council, County Hall, Chelmsford, Essex (accessible to the public via http://www.heritagegateway.org.uk.

The site is located along the western boundary of the former Old White Horse Inn, on land currently a car park and garden area. The land is adjacent to the enclosure earthwork of the scheduled area of Pleshey Castle and town enclosure (SM EX22 HA 1002191 EHER 1126). Pleshey Castle is a good example of a motte and bailey type of earthwork built in the 12th century with an unusually well-preserved town enclosure. The castle was slighted in 1157-8 but refortified in 1167. Only a short length of the north bailey remains, its line possibly marked by Back Lane. As the site lies within the medieval town enclosure, there is a high potential for archaeological finds and features relating to the medieval and post-medieval settlement.

The White Horse Inn is an 18th-century timber-framed and plastered Historic England Grade II listed building with later additions and alterations (Listed building no. 1235459). The inn forms a group of several historic cottages.

4 Aim

Archaeological monitoring was undertaken to record any archaeological deposits which were revealed by the groundworks.




Fig 2 Monitoring results.

5 Results (Figs 2-3)

During 1st to 7th October 2019, a CAT archaeologist monitored the following groundworks:

- a) trenching 34.1m long and 0.65-0.8m deep to accommodate cable and a new pole; b) a pit, 1m by 1.5m and 0.6m deep, for a new junction box.
- Six layers were recorded. The northern part of the trenching was excavated through modern topsoil (L1, c 0.14-0.15m thick) and a layer of sandy silt with frequent CBM inclusions (L2, c 0.27m thick) into natural subsoil (L3, encountered at a depth of c 0.4-0.42m below current ground level [bcgl]). The southern part of the trenching was excavated through L1 (c 0.14-0.15m thick), a build-up layer (L4, c 0.12-0.21m thick) and a layer of ?redeposited natural (L5, c 0.24-0.3m thick) onto L3 (encountered at a depth of 0.59-0.64m bcgl). The pit for the junction box was dug through a modern layer of tarmac (L6, c 0.09-0.12m thick), L4 (c 0.18-0.22m thick) and L5 (c 0.17-0.25m thick) onto L3 (encountered at a depth of 0.51-0.55m bcgl).

Post-medieval pit F1 was revealed in the northern half of the trench. The feature extended beyond the limit of excavation and so its full dimensions could not be ascertained, but its exposed extent was approximately 3.4m wide.

6 Finds

A piece of post-medieval clay pipe stem and brick fragments came from F1 but were not retained for post-excavation analysis.

7 Discussion

Groundworks at this site revealed a post-medieval pit, which was presumably related to activity at the post-medieval cottages.

Fig 1 Site location with the area of the monitoring indicated by the dashed red rectangle.




Fig 3 Representative sections.
