1 Summary

An archaeological evaluation (a single trial trench) was carried out at 'Tile House Bungalow', Stebbing Green, Essex in advance of the construction of a new dwellings associated access and landscaping. The site lies within an area of known archaeological activity, with Roman settlement and agricultural activity identified in fields to the north of the investigation area. No archaeological remains were encountered during the evaluation, despite the proximity of known Roman activity.




Fig 1 Site location and trench plan in relation to proposed development (dashed blue lines).

2 Introduction (Fig 1)

This is the report for an archaeological evaluation carried out by Colchester Archaeological Trust (CAT) at the site of the former Tile House Bungalow, Stebbing Green, Essex on 27th November 2023. The work was commissioned by the landowner, and took place in advance of the construction of a new dwellings with associated access and landscaping.

In response to consultation with Essex County Council Place Services (ECCPS), the Historic Environment Advisor advised that in order to establish the archaeological implications of this application, the applicant should be required to commission a scheme of archaeological investigation in accordance with the *National Planning Policy Framework* (MHCLG 2021).

All archaeological work was carried out in accordance with a *Brief for Trial Trenching & Excavation at land formerly known as 'Tile House Bungalow', Stebbing Green* written by Katie Lee-Smith and detailing the required archaeological work (ECCPS 2023), and a written scheme of investigation (WSI) prepared by CAT (2023b) in response to the brief and agreed with ECCPS in advance of the work.

In addition to the brief and WSI, all fieldwork and reporting was done in accordance with *Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment (MoRPHE)* (Historic England 2015), and with *Standards for field archaeology in the East of England* (EAA **14** and **24**). This report mirrors standards and practices contained in the Institute for Archaeologists' *Standard and guidance for archaeological field evaluation* (CIfA 2020a) and *Standard and guidance for the collection, documentation, conservation and research of archaeological materials* (CIfA 2020b).

3 Archaeological background

The following archaeological background includes extracts of the ECC brief and the Essex Historic Environment Records (EHER) held at Essex County Council, County Hall, Chelmsford, Essex (accessed via http://www.heritagegateway.org.uk).

The Historic Environment Record shows that the proposed development lies within an area of known archaeological finds and deposits. Historically a number of chance finds have been found in fields to the north of the site. In 1938 a local farmer reported that when ploughing the field artefacts were revealed. In 1948 Felsted School Archaeological Society dug five trial-trenches and six test pits to look for the Roman pavement previously reported by the local farmer. They uncovered the tesselated floor, which was damaged by ploughing. Rubbish pits were recorded 50 yards east of the tesselated floor. Several of the trenches revealed the remains of a structure with flint rubble foundations. Finds included Roman pottery, roof tiles and oyster shells (EHER 1238).

To the immediate north-east of the site is an area known as Stebbing Green Roman Mill. In 1988 a large area proposed for a borrow pit drew the attention of the County Council Archaeological section. Archaeologists regularly monitored the stripping. Although most of the area was devoid of features or finds a spread of substantial Roman material was found at the western edge. An excavation on this area was then carried out. A spread of rammed clay with chalk defining a presumed Roman timber building and the presence of many fragments of millstone grit quernstone in and around the building suggests it was the site of a mill. A dog burial was also recorded under the clay floor (EHER 8001, Bedwin 1999).

Stebbing Green is a small hamlet. Although not in a conservation area the site has a number of historic listed buildings nearby. To the east of the site is the Grade II listed mid 16th-century Tile House Farmhouse (EHER 36702). To the north-west of the site are adjoining Grade II listed timber-framed, plastered and thatched cottages Byways and Sunnyside (NHLE 1168880), dated to the 17th century or earlier, with later alterations. To the south of the site is Home Farmhouse, a Grade II listed timber-framed house dating to the 16th-17th century (EHER 36717).

4 Aims

The aims of the archaeological evaluation were to record the extent of any surviving archaeological deposits and to assess the archaeological potential of the site to allow the ECCHEA to determine if further investigation is required.




Fig 2 Evaluation results.

5 Results (Figs 2-3)

A single trial-trench was machine-excavated under the supervision of a CAT archaeologist. The trench was 1.8m wide, T-shaped and totalled 35m in length. To the north-west of the trench, it cut through a modern hardstanding which consisted of a mixture of tarmac plainings and hardcore crush (L1 0.06-0.1m thick). Beneath this and throughout the remainder of the trench, modern topsoil (L2, 0.2-0.3m thick) sealed a subsoil (L3, 0.1m thick) above natural geological deposits (L4, encountered at a depth of 0.45-0.5m below current ground level).

No archaeological remains were encountered during the evaluation. Sondages were cut to investigate the possibility of any potential masking deposits but none were identified.

6 Finds

Fragments of modern brick and concrete were observed in the remains of L1. None of this material was retained.

7 Conclusion

No archaeological remains were encountered during the evaluation carried out at the 'Tile House Bungalow' site. There was no evidence for Roman settlement activity despite its proximity to known find spots to the north.




Fig 3 Representative sections.
